

Lighthouse Pilot 2020 End of Year Report





Introduction

In the fall of 2019, EcoSchools Canada and The Gaia Project embarked on a pilot of EcoSchools Canada's national program. The Gaia Project was instrumental in applying a local lens, onboarding New Brunswick schools, familiarizing schools with the EcoSchools program, and finding ways to integrate the amazing climate action work already underway at schools across the province.

Despite the complications of COVID-19, which led to the cancellation of in-person workshops, as well as the decision to postpone certification celebrations for New Brunswick schools until fall 2020, EcoSchools has gained invaluable feedback from pilot schools and The Gaia Project. This feedback will inform our national program content, as well as, our strategy for rolling out EcoSchools certification across the country.

Feedback

Through the ECA platform and surveys, pilot schools were able to provide valuable feedback on their overall experience in the pilot, on the ECA, and on specific actions and resources. Below is a summary of the feedback that we will be taking into account as we prepare for the national launch of the program in September 2020. Note that the feedback summary is from all participating Lighthouse Pilot schools.

Communication

• Participants were very satisfied with the level of communication and guidance provided by the EcoSchools Canada team throughout the Lighthouse Pilot.

Actions and Resources

- Several schools noted that actions should be modified to be inclusive of projects and activities at a school are ongoing, or an established practice (i.e., rather than framing them only as campaigns).
- Participants found that overall, the quality of action resources was good, but they could be improved upon.
- Learning and Development action Multiple schools noted that student and teacher PD should be separate actions.
- Create Your Own action Multiple schools noted they would appreciate more than one Create Your Own action.

EcoSchools Certification Application

- Pilot participants appreciated the ease of use and functionality of the ECA.
- Some schools would like to include pictures in their application (as was the case with EcoSchools' previous application).

Lessons Learned

The following 'lessons learned' will inform - and already have informed - our planning and development for EcoSchools' national launch in fall 2020. The Lighthouse Pilot was instrumental in allowing us to substantiate a number of foundational aspects of our national model as well as inform new insights into how to improve our program delivery and content.

- A one-size-fits-all model will not work across Canada.
- Listening to local experience and those who are on the ground at schools is essential.
- Establishing a clear and distinct channels of communication with partners is critical (e.g., who is saying what to schools when).
- Clarity around action expectations for schools is key (e.g., campaign vs. established practice).
- The online application is a useful tool for schools and involving students in the application process is a good idea.
- Giving schools channels to share their success (and photos) would be helpful.
- Providing more opportunity for interactive webinars as opposed to purely instructional (especially when in-person workshops are not possible) could facilitate greater program engagement and retention.
- Ensuring program registration is an intuitive, one-step process is key for national launch.
